Torreon Once More Scene of Tumultuous Conflict

American Residents Send Out Alarming Reports of Situation

Rebel Valor at Juchitan no Match For Federal Artillery

As foretold in our last week's issue there has been exceedingly heavy fighting at Juchitan, Oaxaca, which is said to have been reduced to ashes. The inhabitants of Salina Cruz reported that they could see the reflection of the flames...

According to our latest advices, the following towns in the State of Oaxaca are now in open revolt: Petapa, Ixtaltepec, Chihuatlan, Cerrito and Santo Domingo del Mar.

"El Imparcial" reports uprisings at Puruandiro, Michoacan, and at Teoloyucan and Tlalapanatia, in the immediate neighborhood of Mexico City.

Torreon in Arms. By far the most suggestive news, however, comes from Torreon, just as we are about to go to press, and we draw extensively on the exclusive dispatches sent to the "Los Angeles Times" from El Paso, Texas.

The acuteness of the situation is intensified by the fact that the leaders of the striking rioters are proclaiming a Mexico for the Mexicans regime and are shouting, "Down with the American officials" of the big corporations.

For Native Labor. The strikers are urged to action because of the promises which the agitators claim were made to them that the high-priced American officials of the different companies would be replaced with natives...

Paso bank to get into communication with the officials in Washington and notify them of the "critical condition of affairs in Torreon and the Laguna district surrounding it."

Col. Emilio Kosterlitzky, commander-in-chief of the Mexican rurales in the State of Sonora, arrived here this morning from Mexico City, where he had been in conference with President Madero regarding the situation in Northwestern Mexico.

Col. Kosterlitzky is a Polish nobleman, who came to Mexico many years ago and joined the Mexican army. He was promoted for his conduct in the Cananea riots in 1906 and is considered one of the ablest officers in the Mexican army.

General Strike Declared. A general strike has been declared here. The bakers have joined and a bread famine is threatened.

Laredo, Tex., Nov. 15.—Regarding the reported movement of Mexican troops between Monterey and Laredo to forestall alleged insurrectionary activity, it was definitely ascertained today that fifty rurales have gone from Monterey to Lampazos.

Mexico City, Nov. 15.—Three Americans have been killed in Sonora as a result of an uprising of the Yaqui Indians, according to a letter received by El Imparcial, from Hermosillo.

Passion of Mexicans for Liberty has been Unquenchable

So far as the Mexican government is concerned, (we Anarchists knew it in advance, and the revolutionists are learning it by experience), the present one, which rode into power at the behest of the great financiers of this country and on the crest of a wave of temporary popular infatuation is no more the friend of the revolting people than was the Diaz regime.

However, neither the industrial population nor the rural one is heeding his appeal. Despite the silence of newspapers in the eastern and central sections of this country, the revolution—the economic revolution—is in full swing, and heading straight for free land.

Three outcomes of this immense movement are possible: 1. A military organizer of the Diaz type may arise, and unite military forces so as to subdue the people for a time.

The present condition,—that of sporadic fighting, and general insubordination—may go on for a year, or two or three. It cannot go on indefinitely. The great property owners will ask more drastic measures; these not forthcoming, some governmental change must follow.

Now, the best means of keeping informed is to read "Regeneracion" published at 914 Boston St., Los Angeles, California. Three-fourths of the paper is in Spanish, but the fourth page is in English.

While the paper refuses to label itself with any "ism," its war cry is "Land and Liberty," its teachings anarchistic. It is a tensely alive, having little space for theory but much for facts supporting those theories which are dear to all of us.

To sum up: Our Mexican brothers have appealed to us in a really heart-rending manifesto not to remain ignorant of their struggle; not to believe it is a political one but an economic one, coming down to the primal needs of man; not to ignore the fact that their battle is our battle; and that we sustain them in this immense struggle which must go on a long time yet.
