The Union is at present independent. The officials are negotiating with the A. F. I. Within the union there are many class conscious workers and some Lovestoneites such as Rosen and Ravitch who have influence. On the picket lines, members of the Left Opposition have been fighting to extend the strike.

The strike meetings are well attended and have been addressed by Tresca from the anarchists. Thomas from the socialists, and Gitlow from the Lovestoneites who was introduced as a "Labor Leader". Members of the picket committee and officials of the union were in favor of having Hugo Ochler from the Communist League of America speak to the strikers, but when Ravitch and other Lovestoneites found this out they objected and used their influence to prevent Ochler from getting the floor. The Lovestoneites believe it is alright for socialists and anarchists to speak but not for the Left Opposition.
