Call Upon Roosevelt to Open Doors of America

NEWARK, N. J .- The Joint Executive Committee of the Essex County Workers Alliance, representing the thousands of jobless in this area, have refused to swallow the misleading propaganda of the American bosses that letting down the immigration bars to the victims of Nazi terror will take jobs away from American work-

In a resolution, unanimously endorsed by the board last Thursday night, these representatives of the organized jobless called upon the U. S. Congress and Roosevelt to open the doors of America to the refugees from Nazism. The resolution demanded that all quota restrictions be lifted for all refugees from fascist countries.

Wise to Boss Agitation This action, introduced by George Breitman, a leading member of the Essex County W. A., demonstrates that the jobless are becoming increasingly wise to the fact that it is capitalism and the capitalists who are responsible for taking the jobs away from millions of American workers, and not other workers. Barring the refugees from America will not give the unemployed jobs.

NEWARK JOBLESS Union Leader Demands Open Door for Refugees

That organized labor must take the lead in securing sanctuary in America for victims of Nazi persecution, and that trade unionists here must prepare to prevent a repetition of Nazism here, were the outstanding statements made by Carl Skoglund, President of General Drivers Union, Local 544, in an interview with a Socialist Appeal reporter today.

"I am fully in accord with your demand that America's doors be opened to these victims of race hatred," declared President Skoglund.

"As the workers increasingly engage in struggles against the employing class, there will undoubtedly be a systematic attempt made to incite racial hatred. Anti-Semitism and anti-Catholicism will be part of the arsenal of American fascism. We see this already in Minneapolis, where the Silver Shirts are organizing, combining anti-Semitism with anti-unionism. Our union is ready to fight this reactionary movement with every means at our command. We have organized a Union Defense Guard for this purpose, which is engaged in rooting out fascist activities wherever they can be unearthed."

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U.S. Prepares To Bridges' Dictatorship Drubbed By CIO Leaders

To South America Rubber And Shoe Worker Delegates To CIO Convention Defy Machine; Back Fight For Democracy

> (Special to Socialist Appeal) PITTSBURGH, Pa .- The growing opposition to Harry Bridges, Stalinist west coast C.I.O. director, and his rule or ruin policies, that developed at the C.I.O. convention here scored a signal victory despite a last minute intercession by John L. Lewis in behalf of Bridges.

> An attempt by the Bridges forces from the west coast to get an endorsement of his policies at a private meeting of leading international union presidents who have local unions on the west coast failed dismally.

The meeting was called by the president of the Stalinist-controlled California C.I.O. council. Its purpose became apparent immediately when all international presidents except Homer Martin, of the auto workers, were invited. Bridges "Defends"

Bridges opened the meeting with a smooth speech in defense of his policies and he urged the over' completely to the Roosevelt international union presidents to force their west coast locals into his councils. He tried to blame "a few disgruntled leaders" for the attacks on himself, and said the "rank and file is with me."

No sooner did he finish than S. H. Dalrymple, president of the United Rubber Workers of America rose to expose the lies in Bridges' statements by making a Dalrymple Attacks

NICOS PANAYIOTIDIS

Our comrade Nicos Panayiotidis, member of the Central Committee of the former Internationalist Communist League, dled a few weeks ago in the fortress of Acronopolis, where he has been imprisoned since the summer of 1937.

A working class militant since his early youth, Comrade Panayiotidis received his training as the leader of many strikes among the shoe workers of Piraeus, from whose ranks he emerged. Arrested and jailed repeatedly, he displayed unshakable courage in the face of unceasing persecution.

Hounded by the police of Metaxas, he continued his work illegally and rendered invaluable services to the organization of the Fourth Internationalists. Arrested in 1937, he was savagely tortured and then thrown into the miserable dungeon where at last, his body broken, he died.

In the last letter he managed to get out, he wrote:

"We know that we are all going to die. But our deaths will not be in vain. Our corpses will become banners for the proletariat. Sign statements of capitulation in order to get out of prison? Then what would we do with our dishonored lives? If it is not possible to be free to work for the revolution, then it is better to die in a concentration camp.

Together with all the comrades of the Fourth International we salute Nicos Panayiotidis, victim of capitalist oppression, soldier of the revolution.

TRUCE DECLARED IN CHILE WHEN **WORKERS ARM**

Popular Front And Fascists For U.S. Imperialism

By DONALD BERGNER

Rumblings of civil war were neard last week in Chile as the opposing parties quarrelled over the tiny majority won by Pedro Aguirre Cerda, joint Presidential candidate of the popular front and fascists. The actual outbreak was averted only by the withdrawal of his recount demand by Gustavo Ross, the defeated conservative candidate.

Final election returns were not officially announced as yet, but unofficial published reports indicate that the large rural vote for Ross cut Aguirre's majority to only 800 votes out of nearly 500,-000. Ross charged coercion at the polls by bands of popular frontists and Nacistas (fascists).

The conservative government mouthpiece, La Nacion, claimed the popular frontists were organizing an armed revolt should Aguirre be counted out. The popular frontists in turn charged that the conservatives were arming to keep out Aguire, the representative of American imperialism, and put in Ross, who is more friendly towards the British.

The rapid arming of the trade union and Socialist workers undoubtedly had a great deal to do with the calling of a truce between the two representatives of the rival imperialisms. They both must have been afraid of the armed might of the Chilean masses.

The Nazis are evidently still in their unique "front" with the Stalinists, The "Popular Liberating Alliance," composed of the two fascist groups: the Nacistas and the "Union Socialista," issued a statement on Nov. 10 that it would give unstinted support to Aguirre in case of trouble. The popular frontists have also tipped their hats to the Nazis. Grateful for the 15,000 Nazi votes that swung the election for Aguirre, they call the election a triumph over "right-wing Fascism"(?!).

> But the past has once again caught up with the Stalinists. The editors of the Communist carelessly published an article by their Chilean leader, Carlos Contreras Labarca, which must have been written about two months ago. Contreras gives a thumb-nail sketch of Ibanez:

"Show Me Your Friends . . ." "Dictator from 1927 to 1931; anti-worker and anti-people, he persecuted the labor movement and the C. P. implacably, served Yankee imperialism, even when he castigated. . . . Alessandri, Ross, etc. and liquidated the English monopoly on nitrate." A note is added: "Events have confirmed the prediction that Ibanez would resort to open betrayal. Ibanez led the recent Nazi putsch."

This is the man who supports the "popular front!"

But the article in the Communist, after indulging in 13 attacks on the horrid Trotskyites who further class struggle and a labor government, contains a veritable gem of proof-if any is still needed-of the pro-imperialism of the Stalinists. Contreras writes:

". . . the people have always respected and always will respect the provisions of the Political Constitution of the State which guarantee the property of foreign capital, and, in general, of all capital. . . ." To put it bluntly.
