Of the branches competing for the Fourth International banner, San Francisco and Detroit have gone over the top. Both these keep on collecting for the campaign,



> NEW YORK CITY .-- A battle between 11,000 taxi-drivers and the big fleet companies began this week when the C.I.O. Transport Workers Union called a strike Tuesday afternoon.

Within two hours, 8,500 drivers and 1,000 maintenance men recabs idle in the garages. The addition of the night men will bring the total of cabs laid up to 8,500. Over 5,000 owner-driver cabs classed as independents are not affected by the strike call.




