How Daladier Was Really Welcomed in North Africa

Truth travels slowly indeed.

When Premier Daladier recently toured French North Africa in a national demonstration against Fascist Italy's colonial designs, the press was full of accounts of the enthusiasm of the natives. Everywhere, every day of the tour, thousands of indigenous Tunisians and Algerians, it seems, manifested their loyalty to French "democracy." To the initiated, this was very strange news. Why should the colonial slaves pay such vibrant homage to their impevialist overseers?

Only now, a month after the event, the real state of affairs is brought to light, on the basis of reports carried in the local Tunisian press. Everywhere, in Tunis, in Bizerte, in Bardo, in Bab El Khadra, the natives demonstrated under the banner of their nationalist organization, the "Destour." Daladier was greeted everywhere with cries of "Long live the Destour," "Down with the privileges," "We demand a Tunislan Parliament." In other words, the demonstrations were really for national independence . . . and not for French "democracy."

The balance sheet: Two "Destourians" arrested at Tunis and sentenced to five years of exile. Mass arrests at Bab El Khadra with blanket sentences of one month and fifteen days for women and two months for men. Nine arrested at Bardo with similar penalties. And so on down the line. . . . Demonstrations for French "democracy"? Pure mockery.

Naturally the Stalinists go along the whole hog "for the safety of the empire." An indication of the success of their agitation for French imperialism may be gleaned from a recent election result in Algeria. In the vote for Municipal Councillor of Algiers, the candidate of the revolutionary Party of the Algerian People, Boumandjel, received 2,074 votes against 659 for the secretary of the Algerian Communist Party, Boukhort, who was running against him.

Sir Stafford Cripps Out on A Limb with his Popular Front

Sir Stafford Cripps, member of Parliament and of the Labour Party Executive, has been expelled from the British Labour Party for issuing a memorandum to local branches, over the head of the leadership, calling for a Popular Front policy "in order to oust the National [Chamberlain] Government."

Always considered a left-winger, the previous attacks of the reactionary Executive had raised a large following for him among the rank and file. His adoption of the Stlinist People's Front propaganda as part of his policy has reversed this relationship entirely in favor of the Labour party leadership. They now quote Cripps against Cripps and with especial effectiveness. What can

this latest convert to the People's Front reply to a quotation of his, which is constantly held up to him, such as this, in 1934:

"There must be no compromise over socialism, no coalition or arrangement with others who were not socialists. That way lay sui-

Or this, in 1935:

"The National Government had done quite well for a capitalist government. . . . There is really very little case at all for an alternative government within the capitalist system. "I don't think we should fix our eyes on the ex-Liberals and the middle class people,

but that we should fix our eyes on the work-

His present position can only gain him the allegiance of the British Communist party, which has never amounted to anything and is now in even greater decline. Before the broad rank and file of the Labour party he appears, in view of his previous stand, as a ridiculous mountebank. Sir Stafford is out on a limb and so is his Popular Front.

However, as the reaction of British labor to the National Register (see the Socialist Appeal, Feb. 10) shows, the Labour Party Executive is not at all rid of healthy opposition to its reactionary policies, despite its advantage in combating Sir Stafford's somersaults. Quite the con-

There are many workers today who believe that industrial unions were conceived by John L. Lewis and first organized by the C.I.O. This is far from the truth, however, and it would be well for workers who are concerned with organizing the unorganized or attempting to preserve the great gains made in the recent wave of the industrial union movement, to look back upon the early struggles of the labor movement for advice and inspiration,

The Knights of Labor in the early Eighties, was an industrial organization. It included all workers regardless of trade or skill. It carried on national campaigns to better the working conditions and to shorten the hours of the American working class. Despite the many faults of the Knights of Labor, it will always be remembered as the first national labor organiza-

The Knights Failed to

Fight for Better Conditions

The eventual decline of the Knights as a force in the labor movement was due largely to its failure to conduct a serious fight for increased wages and shorter hours in the shop. It was far too concerned with improving the soul. The leadership of the Knights became involved in such schemes as co-operative gold mines, stores and farms. Powderly, the guiding spirit of the Knights, carried on a campaign for the eight-hour day but when the workers of Chicago went on strike to gain their demands, and when the Haymarket bomb was thrown by a provocateur, he abandoned the fight and deserted the cause of labor. The Knights gave way to the American Federation of Labor.

The A.F. of L. was a craft organization then as it is now, but many attempts to break up the crafts and form industrial or horizontal unions were made. In 1901 Daniel De Leon, a leading socialist of his time, split the labor movement and the Socialist Party on the issue of industrial unions. He believed that only through industrial organization and a revolutionary program could the workers achieve substantial gains. And he was, we will agree, correct. But his mistake, and the mistake of all the later attempts to split the labor movement, lay in the manner in

Masses Ignored De Leon's

"Dual" Union

The Socialist Trades and Labor Alliance organized by De Leon became a dual movement to the already established American Federation of Labor. The mass of workers stayed with the A. F. of L. and the S.T.L.A. was short-lived. The withdrawal of hundreds of able, experienced organizers and leaders from the A. F. of L. had its effect on the movement and the sharp fight between the A. F. of L. and the De Leon unions caused great dissension in the ranks of labor. The Socialist Trades and Labor Alliance became known as a "dual" union. It carried on a fierce war against the A. F. of L. and it died within a

The Industrial Workers of the World-the "Wobblies"-also an industrial organization, was formed in 1905. The hide-bound conservatism and the reactionary leadership of the A. F. of L. sent thousands of militant workers into the ranks of the I.W.W. For ten years the I.W.W. was a force to be reckoned with. It carried on hundreds of strikes and at one time claimed 100,000 dues-paying members. The I.W.W., although it made many mistakes will always be most colorful and inspiring organization of attempts of the past,

The I.W.W. too, however, could not stand up against the bosses on the one hand and the majority of workers who were not yet ready for the social revolution. It declined as a result of its failure to hold gains made in the struggle and the many internal factional fights which were but a reflection of the objective conditions in America. The I.W.W. today is but a shadow of a shadow of its former self.

Bureaucracy and Stupidity Bore the T.U.U.L.

The fight for industrial organization went on. One of the most recent steps in its development was the Trade Union Unity League-the brainchild of the Stalinists. This sectarian set-up was the cause of some of the bitterest factional sruggles ever recorded in labor history. The T.U.U.L. was an industrial organization and it was "revolutionary" but in no way did it represent, for instance, the tradition of the I.W.W. or any preceeding split with the A. F. of L. The T.U.U.L. was the result of stupidity and bureaucratic misunderstanding.

It divided the workers, particularly in New York and Chicago, into two armed camps and the only gains made throughout the history of the T.U.U.L. were made by the bosses. It was a pure and simple Stalinist-controlled movement from beginning to end and the workers stayed away from it in immense numbers. The factional strife which ensued caused the death of several workers and only played into the hands of the red-baiting officials of the A. F. of L.

After a few years of unsuccessful attempts to win influence and members the T.U.U.L. dissolved and its members went back to the

Industrial Unionism Is

Basis for CIO-AFL Unity

What, then, is the difference between the C.I.O. and all other attempts to organize industrial unions? Why did the C.I.O. succeed in building a movement of millions of workers? Why has the C.I.O. made great gains where all other splits failed to win even a foothold?

The difference lies in the manner in which the fight against craft unionism and its leaders was conducted, and, what is more important, the C-I.O. was formed when the industry of America was predominantly a mass-production industry. Industrial unionism was not the result of John L. Lewis's decision to embark on a personal campaign against William Green and Matthew Woll. It was much more than that. It was the result of the obvious inability of the old craft unions to cope with the rapid growth of mass-

production industries in America. Lewis merely took advantage of the growing discontent of millions of workers. And further, the fight to establish industrial unions was carried on within the already organized labor movement. There was no split until every worker in the country was fully aware of all the issues and ready to take up the fight.

The C.I.O. did not break away from the A. F. of L, until it became large and powerful. And the question of unity between the C.I.O. and the A.
