John L. Lewis waited until the last days of the CIO convention...

First dispute between the CIO leaders and their Stalinist allies threatened to arise over the election of a vice president.

Clipping the C.P.

At the last minute the Stalinists retreated and Curran withdrew his name.

However, the real defeat for them came when the CIO executive council announced that Harry Bridges was only California director of the CIO.

John Brophy, plous fellow-traveler of the C.P. who was national director of the CIO, was also clipped.

White Haywood has played ball with the Stalinists in New York, he is a one hundred per cent Lewis man.

Incidentally, Haywood is a capable organizer and negotiator, whose abilities will mean considerable improvement in the activities of the CIO from Washington.

Adolph Germer is being transferred from the Michigan CIO directorship to a post in Washington.

Tightening Hold

In essence, the meaning of these moves is that Lewis is tightening his hold organizationally on the CIO by putting "reliable" Mine Workers Union officials in all key CIO posts.

Besides, Lewis gave an interview to the West Coast press in which he made his first public pronouncement on the question of "communists in the CIO."

"If there are any budding young communists who think they can make a life work of taking over the CIO for the Communist Party they had better forget it," Lewis is quoted as saying.

"The Communist Party sent in witnesses to the Dies Committee to brag about their domination of the CIO and build up the Party," he added.

"There will be no witch hunts or red hunts and any union has the right to elect or select anyone it chooses to lead it, however I will insist that CIO leaders give their entire allegiance to the organization," Lewis declared.

This is the first direct attack on the Stalinists in the CIO that Lewis has made. It takes considerable significance, therefore.

Purge in Offing

Naturally the question arises: Will there be a purge of the Stalinists in the CIO, and on what basis?

A preliminary examination of the moves indicates that a purge in one form or another is in the offing. However, Lewis reveals his caution by the statement that there will be no witch hunt.

The attitude of the Stalinists on the Lewis moves has not yet been made public since the Daily Worker simply refuses to print any news of the situation to date.

The next week or so will give a clearer answer to the questions posed by the Lewis statement and his organizational maneuvers.

(Continued from Page 1) ing." Dwight Macdonald stated. "The workers of New York must fight that ruling," he went on, "or they will lose the only opportunity they may have for years to express their Socialist sympathies at the polls."

Meanwhile, the six day deadline for the remittance of specifications outlining the challenge to Max Shachtman's Bronx candidacy had passed, the Campaign Committee disclosed.

Commenting on the efforts to remove Shachtman's name from the ballot, Secretary Macdonald stated, "Like the manner in which George Lyman Paine's candidacy was thrown out by the Board of Elections, the machinations of the Board in withholding its brief challenging Shachtman's candidacy is an obvious maneuver to keep another genuine anti-war candidate off the ballot. But the Board had better watch its step," Macdonald warned.

"The number of signed nominating petitions placing Shachtman's name on the ballot is three times the number legally required. It will be interesting to observe what the Board will dig up this time. In any case, the hearings before the Board of Elections on Shachtman's challenge are to begin Monday, October 23, at 10 a.m.," he concluded.

Shachtman Meetings

The Campaign Committee announced today that thousands of letters are being mailed to individuals and organizations in the Bronx sympathetic to the candidacy of Shachtman. The letters will contain the facts on the efforts of the Board of Elections to rule Shachtman off the ballot and will call upon all workers opposed to the war to rally behind the candidate of the Socialist Workers Party.

Shachtman will address a public indoor election rally this Wednesday evening, October 26, at Hollywood Gardens, 896 Prospect Avenue.

On Wednesday evening, October 23, Shachtman will speak at Bronx Terrace, 3861 Third Avenue, near Claremont Park way.

Ohio, Michigan SWP Branches Hold Profitable Active Workers Conference

(Special to the Socialist Appeal)

TOLEDO, Ohio—A highly successful Active Workers Conference, with full representation from 7 branches of the Socialist Workers Party in Ohio and Michigan, was held here Sunday afternoon, October 8, 58 delegates attended, including leading trade-unionists from auto, steel, rubber and other mass industries in Flint, Detroit, Toledo, Cleveland, Akron, Youngstown and New Castle.

The conference included a report of the activities of the branches in the district during the recent War Referendum campaign and a discussion of ways to conduct a continuation of the anti-war campaign with even greater success.

Discuss Unions

A considerable portion of the conference dealt with a discussion of the role of the trade-

unions in the war which the American capitalist class is making ready to enter. Delegate after delegate described how the war is already affecting the unions. The bosses are beginning to crack down on the job committees in the auto plants, using the pretext of government war orders to curb any opposition to speed-ups, wage-cuts and the firing of union militants. Price rises have already taken a heavy slash in every worker's pay. Extension of hours and technological improvements are already proving sufficient to guarantee against any great reduction of unemployment.

It was agreed by the delegates that, despite all the repressions in the war, the workers of this country would face such misery and so many blows at their union rights and living standards that the objective conditions will exist for the revolutionary socialists to lead the workers in great class-struggles against the bosses and their war.

While stating that all the belligerent powers "are equally guilty" for the present war the resolution states that one of the main aims of Anglo-French imperialism in their war against Hitler is "to try to bring to power in Germany that section of the bourgeoisie which will immediately engage in military intervention against the USSR".

A New Theory Being Born

Yesterday the policy of Peoples Frontism was defended on the theory that fascism (particularly, Hitlerism) represented the most reactionary, most chauvinistic, most imperialistic and most anti-Soviet section of the bourgeoisie. Therefore, it was concluded, a bloc was necessary with the "democratic section" of the ruling class against fascism. Would it be surprising if tomorrow the Stalinists concoct a new theory that a bloc is necessary between the working class, and the sections of the German bourgeoisie which are not in favor of an immediate war against the Soviet Union—the supporters of Hitler, who apparently are less reactionary, etc.—against the extreme German imperialists who are allies of Chamberlain? The new resolution opens the door wide for this development.

AUTO WORKERS GIRD AGAINST BOSS ATTACK

Lockout Is Union-Smashing Foretaste Of War-Time Rule

"In Department 107, Dodge, so fast is the rate of production demanded by the company that new automatic machines are burned up, and the workers with them."

In the Plymouth plant the speed decreed in turning out bearing blocks is so high that men cannot keep pace. One man lost four fingers as a result.

"In the McGee wire department at Plymouth production demands have been stepped up 20 per cent."

"Shop stewards who attempted to discuss these affairs have been fired."

Dozens of workers have been fired in the Chrysler plants for refusing to accede to the speed-up demands.

GENERAL MOTORS ALSO TRIES SPEED-UP

FLINT, Mich.—General Motors, following up Chrysler's footsteps, has begun a terrific speed-up campaign in all the plants which has precipitated a wave of protest among the workers that may culminate in a strike.

The Chevrolet local of the UAW-CIO is taking a strike vote this week end, after wholesale discrimination, speed-up and provocation in the plants.

Shift Workers

Shop stewards in Chevrolet, along with many known union militants, have been transferred from jobs at which they have worked for years, into other plants, and put to work at the most grueling tasks, in an attempt to break organization. Union men have been fired. Production has been speeded up all along the line. Superintendents have assumed an arrogant attitude toward the union men.

Veteran workers claim that never before has the company applied the whip so vigorously.

Women Protest

At the Fisher Body plants the same situation prevails but not yet in such a sharp manner. Certain departments are affected. In one department in the South Fisher plant, employing

COMPANY SPIES DYNAMITED OKLA. OIL PROPERTIES

TULSA, Okla.—The ten-month struggle of the Oil Workers Union against the Mid-Continent Petroleum Corp. received fresh impetus this week when it was discovered that company officials had hired agents provocateurs to dynamite company property and blame strikers.

Elmer Davis, NLRB attorney, announced at the hearing on charges against the company that he would present evidence proving this damaging point.

Previously, the company, through control of the local city officials had arrested and sought to frame over 100 strikers on charges of violence. The victims were freed by jury decision.

women, the speed-up was so unbearable that 50 women workers marched in a body to the manager's office, protesting the rate of production and signifying their determination to hold down to a reasonable speed. Things were smoothed over, but the speed-up drive continues.

In Buick, huge Flint division of General Motors, with plants covering an area of over 15 blocks, the company is importing southern youths to aid in forcing double time production. Foremen and superintendents are lashing the men to the point of exhaustion in many divisions.

Great Test

Labor in the auto industry now faces a great test. All indications are that a great battle will develop unless the company retreats. Should the UAW-CIO succeed in defeating the speed-up and labor-smashing attempts now current, it would be only the first step in defense of the rights labor has won after years of struggle. As soon as the United States gets into the war, labor again will have to fight.

Union leaders should realize that the current campaign to smash the UAW-CIO is an important phase of the war plans of Big Business. The military dictatorship to be initiated with the first day of war will function more smoothly, if the unions are first smashed.

Only the most militant organization and action will save the UAW-CIO in the struggle which has just begun. All the forces of Capital and Government are lined up against labor. Pussy-footing policy, too prevalent in the recent past in the UAW-CIO, will result in certain destruction.

Labor must nip this attempt to destroy collective bargaining in the bud. It must defeat the attempts of industry to break the back of labor in preparation for war.

Whip of War Persecution Falls on Four in Canada

Following the arrest of Frank Watson on September 15 as a result of his denunciation of Canadian participation in the imperialist war, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, aided by the Toronto police, raided the homes of four workers on October 4 and arrested them on a charge of possessing "subversive literature."

The four workers, Arthur Bartolotti, Ruggero Benvenuti, Ernest Gava and Marco Joachim, are being held without bail. If found guilty under the new Canadian War Measures Act, these militants face heavy prison sentences or worse.

Age-Old Charge

In reporting the arrests of the four men, the Toronto Daily Star points out that the authorities refused to disclose the nature of the "subversive literature."

Since the Dominion government cannot charge these four workers with any real or overt crime, it has resorted to the age-old subterfuge of accusing them of possessing "subversive literature."

The following squib appeared in the Minneapolis Star-Journal: "WAR NEWS: The Minneapolis Artificial Limb Co. has already received instructions to have 3,000 artificial limbs per year ready for government purchase if and when the United States enters the war."

Dear Sir: A few weeks ago I visited you with the object of securing support for a drive against the war. American businessman, but it raised doubts in my mind about your anti-war sentiment. The above clipping confirms these doubts.

Automobiles plus liquor keep the business going in the dull years between wars, but when the surviving cannon-fodder — the flower of youth — comes back from the inhuman carnage minus arms, minus legs — Ah! that's something to warm the cockles of the heart of even a great (?) humanitarian like Ray Trautman!

Ray Trautman is a humanitarian alright. He gives jobs to the crippled. While other bosses exploit able-bodied workers, Ray Trautman lives off the backs of cripples!
