

We can state that almost all the leaders are members of the CP or the YCL. There are no professional leaders.

The MOPR of the Caribbean has carried out good work in the sense that it has struggled constantly for the victims of the semi-feudal fascist terror, mobilizing ~~the~~ the working masses. Its organization is weak, owing principally to the fact that the comrades in charge of this work have allowed many MOPR groups and locals to become disorganized, but in November the work was finally left organized in order to be able to crystallize all of our influence in a real organization based on ~~the~~ a production basis.

The FRT has plantation committees, exactly how many it is hard to say, but energy in this direction has been lacking to be able to completely ~~carry out~~ carry out the basic change in our organization from a residential organization into a real strong organization based on production and on the basis of trade union organizations by industry.

The CP and YCL have a very strong national influence. They practically direct the mass organizations (FRT and Caribbean MOPR).

Anti-militarist work is carried out by the comrades who are forced into obligatory military service. Visits have even been organized to these comrades in the barracks, but a serious anti-militarist organization does not exist, owing principally to the fact that it was impossible to be able to attend ~~to~~ to this work and to the very great lack of active elements of the FRT, in order to be able to complete the delegations.

Lately work in the oriental zone (departments of Morazan, La Union, Chalatenango, San Miguel, Usulután, Cuzcatlan, etc.) has been organized. In certain important political aspects our CP has lately shown itself ~~lagging~~ lagging. Two cases: During the first days of October all the political parties bared their rotteness, their deceit to the working masses and our CP and YCL did not think of launching our CP into an independent struggle and separate front against all political parties ~~in order to~~ make our class independent of all the ~~liberal petty bourgeois tendencies and illusions.~~ liberal petty bourgeois tendencies and illusions. Another case, much more serious, was the insurrection of San Miguel. On learning of this, the comrades not only failed to help that insurrection which was liquidating the governmental organizations which was fighting the plantation owners, administrators, etc.; but ~~they~~ they did not even send delegates to cooperate in the work of the insurrectionist comrades; when the leaders of the insurrection of San Miguel were imprisoned, the comrades contented themselves merely by saying that it had been a petty bourgeois movement and the Caribbean MOPR had done absolutely nothing because the members of the CC of CP ~~advanced this criterion; fortunately this procedure was corrected, but only with regard to the Caribbean MOPR work; but work in the insurrection was not carried out.~~

Ideological weakness is the worst danger that exists in the Communist movement, because the lack of clear understanding of the situation not only ~~carries us into~~ carries us into betrayal like in the San Miguel case, but it places ~~us even farther behind than~~ us even farther behind than the tail, in a worse place than that of the wretched "followers" of ~~movements.~~

If it is true that trade union work is carried out regularly, that the work of the Caribbean MOPR with all its defects is carried out and progresses, on the other hand, in a political direction, which is the fundamental one for all of our organizations, our CP and our YCL, our party shows a profound and very serious weakness, since it can place the revolutionary movement in a somewhat ugly and difficult position which might cause it to lose prestige among the working masses and which can have very grave consequences.

All the members of the CP and YCL are active and have constituted the spinal column in the struggle against opportunism.

The trade union organization ~~includes anywhere from 4,000 to 7,000 members;~~ includes anywhere from 4,000 to 7,000 members; it is not possible to ~~obtain true statistics in this regard because of the continual growth of the trade union and the organizing of new trade unions throughout the country. Fluctuation in the later periods has been somewhat strong; but more members have joined than those who have quit or withdrawn.~~
